Useful ideas for Maths

- Write numbers up to 1000 in words and numbers
- Create your own addition and subtraction calculations and use the column method to solve
- Invent and make your own board game
- Multiplication and division 3, 4 and 8 times tables
- Set up a shop to practice adding and subtracting amounts of money to give change
- Learn how to tell the time to the nearest minute
- Create a poster to help you remember the number of days in each month, year and leap year

Example of Challenge

Useful ideas for Writing:

- Keep a diary
- Write a story create a front cover, an illustration of a key event and a blurb to turn your story into a book
- Write a letter to a friend
- Write a book review
- Write a poem and perform it
- Think of ten questions that you could ask a famous person
- Think of as many words you can from larger words e.g. SENTENCE ten, sent, net, etc
- Write a story share as a family. One person write one sentence, then another right the next and so on.
- Play unfortunately / fortunately sentence game e.g. Unfortunately; the bear was lost in the cave. Fortunately, the bear had a torch. Remember to include expanded noun phrases and adverbs to make your sentences exciting.
- Copy a page from your reading book to practice your neat handwriting
- Write a set of instructions
- Act out a scene from your favourite book
- Make a cookery/news/weather programme
- Use the pictures from the story grid to write your own story:

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<u>Reading</u>

Remember to read at least three times a week. We're sending the children home with some extra reading books to help.

Try out the challenges below to find new and exciting ways to enjoy a story:

Read with someone taking turns – a sentence at a time	Read to someone over the phone	Read under a blanket	Read a newspaper or a magazine
Read with a picnic	Arrange a family reading time where everyone reads a book and turns off phones, tablets and televisions	Read in your pyjamas	Read to an animal or cuddle toy
Read for 15 - 30 minutes in one go	Read a book by your favourite author	Draw a picture about what you read today	Read a book that makes you laugh
Read with a torch	Read in bed	Read while wearing a hat	Read instructions to a game and play with your family
