## Plan for phased reopening for Parents, Carers and Pupils – June 2020



At West Borough Primary School, our children are at the heart of everything we do. The past 10 weeks have been unprecedented, never before experienced in our lifetime. During this time we have all had vastly different experiences; some children have been in school, some children have been at home, some have had daily exercise, some won't have been able to leave their homes.

As we prepare to welcome more children back in to school, we need to follow very strict guidelines to keep everyone safe. These guidelines will make school seem a very different place. Please remember, however, that everything lately has been different – queuing at the supermarket, not seeing family and friends, limiting the use of toilet roll! We have all got used to this, we've had to. But we are slowly seeing things begin to return to normal. This will be the same when the children begin to come back to school. It will seem very strange at first but the children will get used to it.

We see this change as an opportunity. Just think, children may learn how to be more independent and get on with the learning themselves; the smaller class sizes may also have their advantages in that all children are seen at all times; the focused, concentrated time spent at their desk in class means that the children may get through the curriculum at a quicker pace than they would do normally; we may also be blessed with many more sunny days, which means, given the size of our grounds, more time can be spent outside.

As we plan to bring your children back in to our care, please know that we will do everything in our power to reassure them, keep them safe and help them to understand and cope with new routines. As a school, since 23<sup>rd</sup> March we have had up to 40 children in school every day and are, therefore, already used to working in a different but safe way.

And as our community code says, "Be kind, be safe, be responsible and embrace challenge." How appropriate!

It is important to remember that the information above is guidance. It is the responsibility for each school to read and digest the guidance and then make the decisions that are best for their setting. Each school will be significantly different from size, to demographic and even down to the number of staff who are available to be in school.

Every decision that is made in this plan starts and ends with the safety of the pupils, staff and families. Although we are educators, this must never take precedence over the health and safety of all of our stakeholders.

The plan is written based on every eligible child taking the place that they are entitled to – that being 60 children in Reception, 60 children in Year I and 60 children in Year 6. We have also considered our Key Worker's children and other children who need to attend school every day.

At various points in the plan, there will be variations. This will be where the plan must be amended either because of the number of children who are taking up the places, or because of the number of available adults.

# <u>Preface</u>

It was announced that, as part of the Government's stepped process, schools should prepare to reopen to Nursery, Reception, Year I and Year 6 pupils from I<sup>st</sup> June. This is in addition to the current provision that is currently being offered to those whose parents are key workers and those that cannot be safely cared for at home. These year groups were chosen because of the early stage of the education (in the cases of Nursery, Reception and Year I) and transition (Year 6).

West Borough Primary School, like many others has been open to the previously mentioned group of pupils since Monday 23<sup>rd</sup> March. During this time our numbers have fluctuated but at times we have had up to 40 children in school. This has allowed us to develop safe routines for children, their families and our staff (including hygiene routines) and to establish appropriate social distancing, depending on the age and stage of the children in our care (aged 3-11). This is a big challenge in schools. Children, especially the youngest children, find it very difficult to keep at a 2 metre distance.

The Government have recognised this and have said that 'We know that, unlike older children and adults, early years and primary age children cannot be expected to remain 2 metres apart from each other and staff.'

Throughout this plan, every effort has been made to ensure that an appropriate distance can be maintained for the children. However, it is not possible to mitigate the 'human' factor in this – that being that a child may still leave a designated area, or come close to and instigate physical contact with another child or adult. No plan could ever reduce the risk of contact between children and adults to zero, and therefore it needs to be made clear that this is the case.

This plan follows the hierarchy of controls as suggested in the guidance to try and reduce the risk of transmitting the infection. They are:

- minimising contact with individuals who are unwell by ensuring that those who have coronavirus symptoms, or who have someone in their household who does, do not attend childcare settings, schools or colleges
- cleaning hands more often than usual wash hands thoroughly for 20 seconds with running water and soap and dry them thoroughly or use alcohol hand rub or sanitiser ensuring that all parts of the hands are covered
- ensuring good respiratory hygiene by promoting the 'catch it, bin it, kill it' approach
- cleaning frequently touched surfaces often using standard products, such as detergents and anti-bac spray
- minimising contact and mixing by altering, as much as possible, the environment (such as classroom layout) and timetables (such as staggered break times)

Personal Protective Equipment	Will the staff and children need to wear face masks?	<ul> <li>It is easiest to share the specific government guidance here for clarity:         <ul> <li>Wearing a face covering or face mask in schools or other education settings is not recommended. Face coverings may be beneficial for short periods indoors where there is a risk of close social contact with people you do not usually meet and where social distancing and other measures cannot be maintained, for example on public transport or in some shops. This does not apply to schools or other education settings. Effective infection protection and control	What happens if my child or someone in their bubble becomes unwell?	<ul> <li>In order to keep the children and adults safe, we need to ensure that we do as much as we can to control and protect against infection. This comes under 4 areas: <ol> <li>Minimise contact with anyone showing symptoms</li> <li>Parents need to check their children for symptoms. If you have any concerns that your child may have any symptoms, you must keep your child at home and isolate for 7 days. All members of the household must isolate for 14 days. #### **Plan Variations**

This plan has been written with the premise that all children will attend, and that there will be sufficient staff for two members of staff in each room, members of admin and site staff, first aiders and a designated safeguarding lead. If we are unable to meet the required number of staff for each bubble, we will amend this plan.

I appreciate this is a very long document for you to read and digest but I know you will understand the reasons why.

Once we have received all your correspondence we will finalise our plan. If you decide you wish for your child to return, you will receive an email by I<sup>st</sup> June confirming your child's bubble and drop-off time. *Do not send your child to school on 2<sup>nd</sup> June if you have not received a confirmation email as they will be turned away.*

# Appendix I Behaviour Policy Addendum

# Covid 19 additions

- Children in Nursery, YR and YI will all enter and exit school via the main entrance to school and car park gates, keeping a social distance following markings on the ground. Parents of children in Bonsai Class and YI will leave the large playground through the Paddock.
- Children in Y6 will enter and exit the school via the Cherry Orchard gate, keeping a social distance following markings on the ground. Parents of Y6 children will, where possible, leave their child at the end of the walkway to minimise contact.
- Allocated times and drop off points must be adhered to in order to minimise contact and to reduce the number of adults in location for drop off and pick up.
- Children will be asked to wash their hands with soap and water at regular intervals throughout the day.
- Children will remain in their new class group (bubble) at all times during the school day and will not mix or socialise with children or adults from other bubbles.
- When leaving the classroom, children must be led by an adult, keeping a social distance.
- Children will have their own space in the classroom and will be reminded to keep their own equipment and water bottles for themselves.
- Children will **all** use the toilet and wash their hands before going out for break or lunchtime play.
- Children will be guided in their bubbles to different zones of the playground/field.
- For break and lunchtime, children will wear a coloured band, the colour of their bubble, to allow for easy identification.
- Children will not use the large equipment at break and lunchtimes but each bubble will have a box of easy cleanable equipment to use.
- Children will be reminded to use tissues and to cover their mouths when sneezing and coughing and then to wash their hands. 'Catch it, bin it, kill it' will be on posters around school.
- Children will be reminded to avoid touching their mouth, nose and eyes with their hands.
- Children will only use toilets allocated for their bubble, will ask to use the toilet and dependent on age/no medical need, may have to wait.
- Children experiencing any symptoms of coronavirus will be sent home.
- The expectation for children who are not attending school, will be to continue with the home learning set on a weekly basis.
- Should additional support for behaviour of pupils in bubbles be required, non-class based SLT will be available for support and will liaise with parents as required.
- The school's normal 'slip' system may not be in operation. Pupils displaying challenge behaviours will be supported by SLT.
- Should the necessity arise for a pupil to have 'timeout' the Lodge will be used. This will be cleaned once the child returns to their bubble by a member of SLT.
