
Year 3 Remote Learning – Term I Week 6 (5.10.20)







An introduction, at least 3 paragraphs and a conclusion.

Each paragraph has a different point. Each point has facts and evidence to support it.


The letter only shows one point of view. It includes connectives such as: however, therefore, furthermore.

The letter includes powerful adjectives. Includes rhetorical questions to make the reader think.

The conclusion summarises the main points and gives an opinion.
