

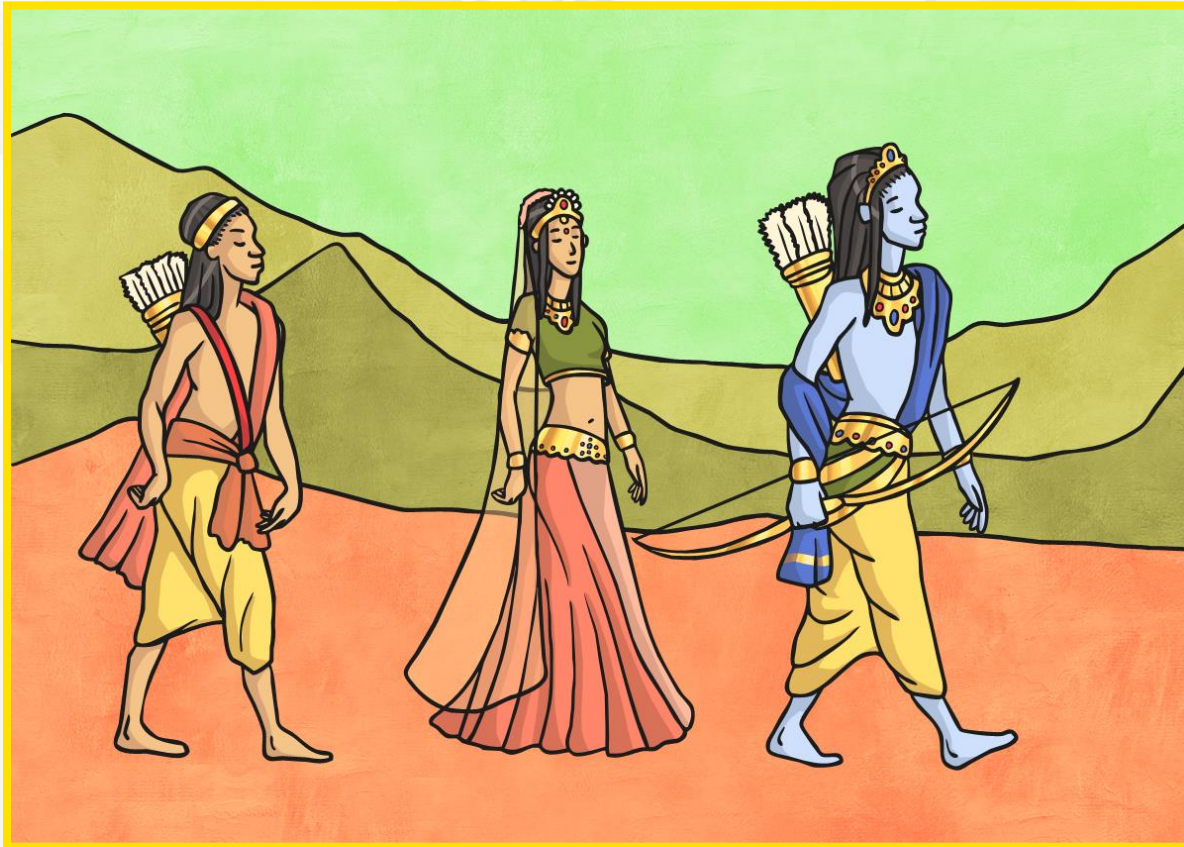

One day, Rama and Sita were banished from their home by the King. Rama's brother, Lakshmana, joined them in exile.



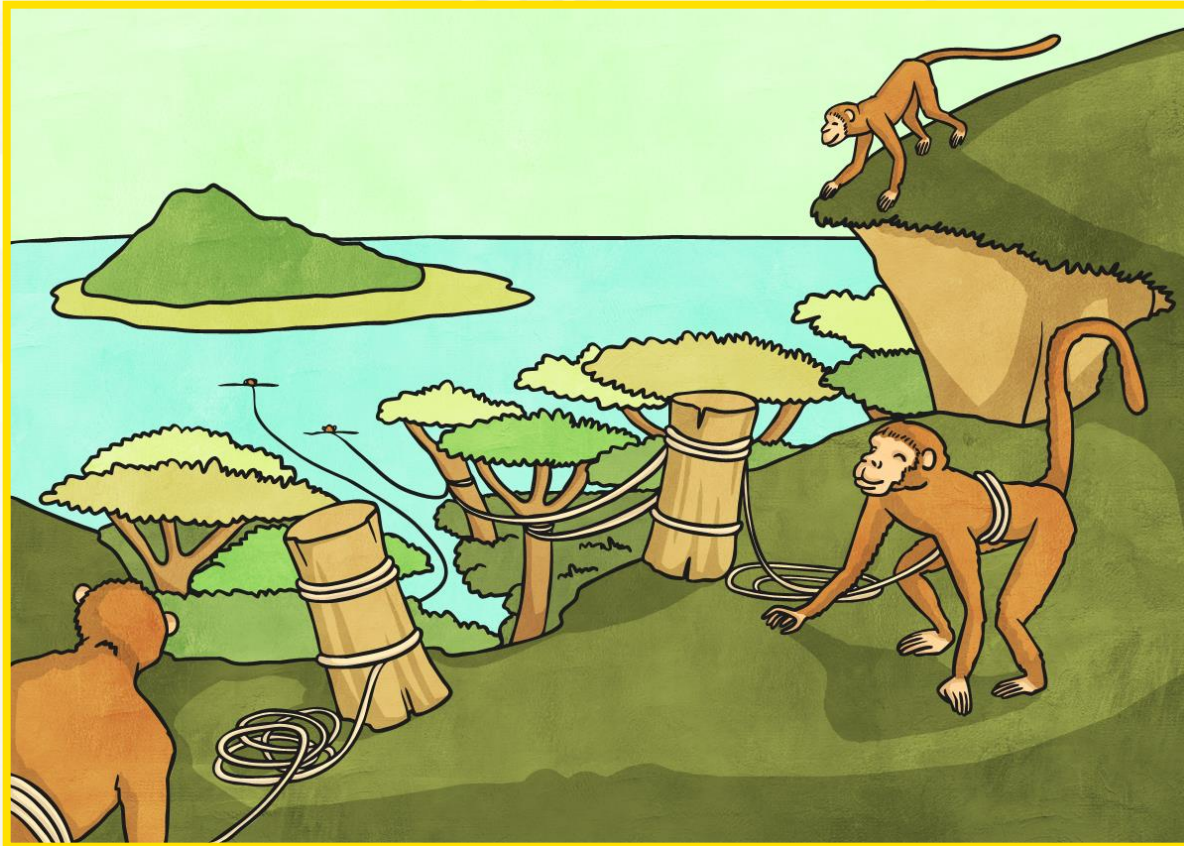
Living nearby was a terrible demon king, Ravana. He had ten heads and twenty arms, and was feared throughout the land.



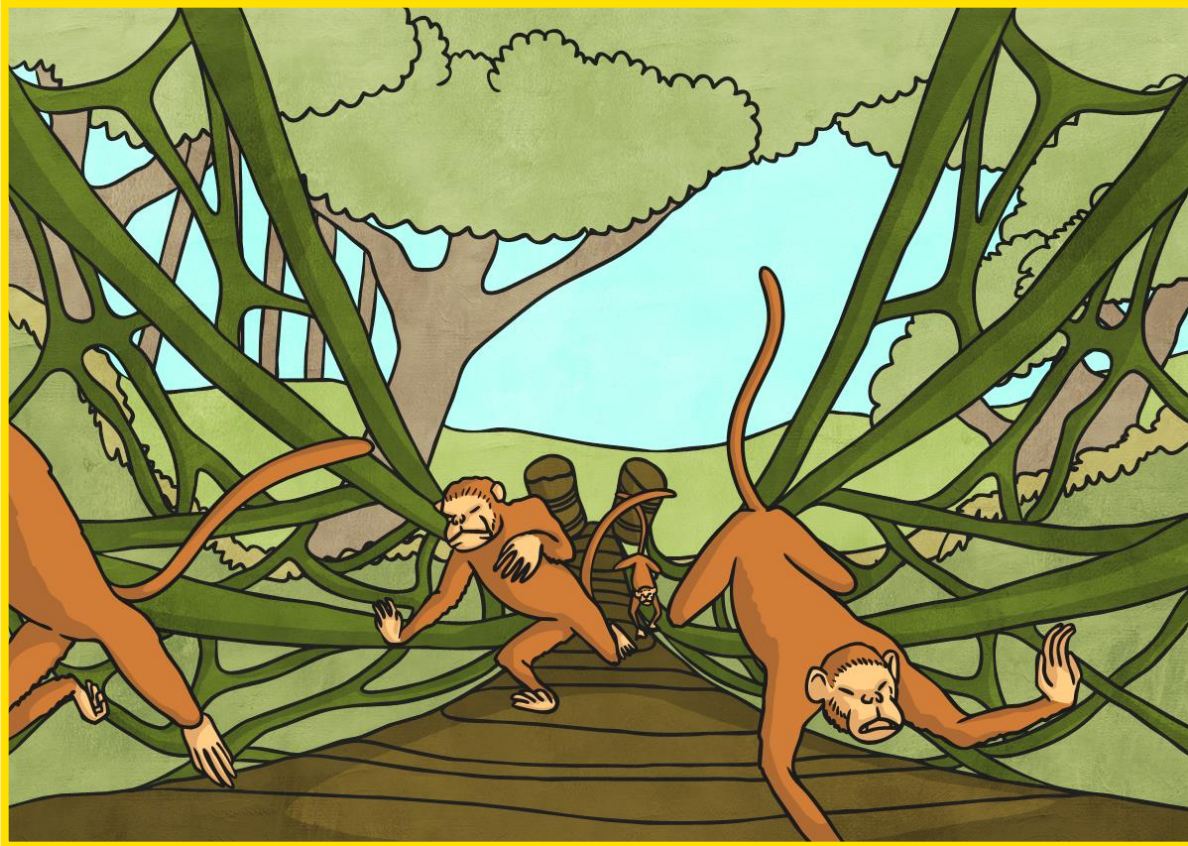
Then, one day, Ravana kidnapped Sita and took her away in his chariot. Clever Sita left a trail of her jewellery for Rama to follow.

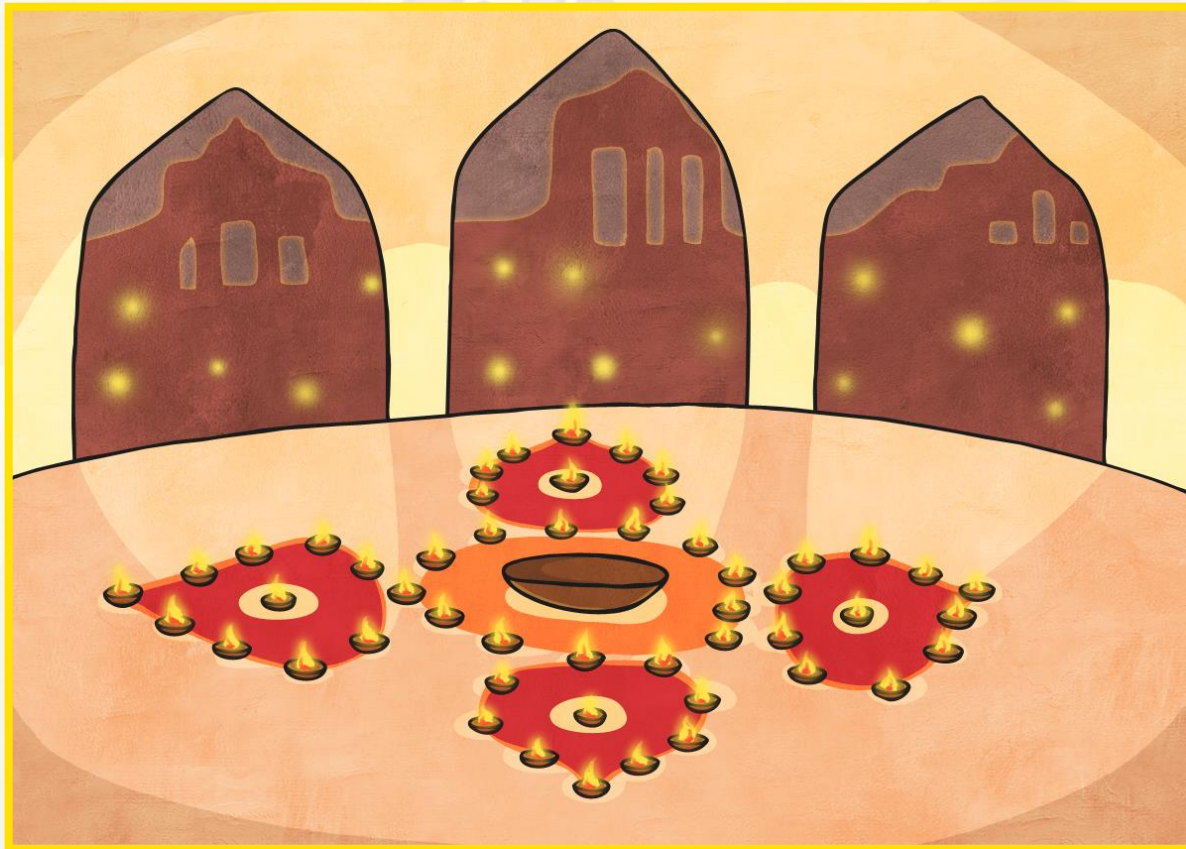
When the bridge was built, they rushed across it and fought a mighty battle.
