
WALT: use sketching techniques to plan an observational drawing.


S2S I can...

- Use line, shading, blending and texture techniques in my sketching
- Identify which technique I should use and when
- Plan my final observational sketch

So far we have explored line using pencil.

- Pressing hard/light
- Hold the pencil at the top/middle/bottom
- Changing our position sitting/standing





We have also explored shading and blending to show tone, dark to light.

- Our pencil lines go in the same direction.
- We can go back over an area to make a darker tone, but it is harder to make an area lighter

Last week we explored creating texture using different patterns or shapes and how to blend these to show tone, dark to light.



We have practiced these new skills making our own artwork of shapes and patterns.

Now we can apply these new skills to some observational sketching.

What is chocolate made from?



Cacao Pods are harvested for their beans.

The beans are dried, roasted and ground to

make chocolate.







We are going to draw an observational pencil sketch of Cacao Pods!

We need to start by using our skills of...

Observation.



Look closely at the object we want to draw and think about...


- Colour

- Tone
- Shading





First we will look at the outer husk or shell of the pod. What do you notice? Let's zoom in.






Use the first square on the worksheet to experiment and recreate the tone and texture of the outer husk of the Cacao Pod.






