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SPaG-subordinate clauses

A clause is a group of words that includes a subject and a verb.

There are two types of clauses,
independent clauses and subordinate clauses

SPaG-subordinate clauses

The independent clause makes sense on its own because it is a complete thought.

For example:

I went to town.

It was red.

A subordinate clause supports the independent clause. The opening words of subordinate clauses show that they are dependent on the independent clause.

For example:

after the storm cleared

because he didn't like chocolate

SPaG-subordinate clauses

A subordinate clause can come at various points in a sentence.

You might use one at the **front of a sentence.
For example, a fronted adverbial can be a type of subordinate clause:**

Like a bullet speeding through the air, he ran through the door.

A comma breaks up the subordinate clause.



SPaG-subordinate clauses

You might want to use one at the **end** of the sentence:

She went straight home, after a hard day at work.

A comma breaks up the subordinate clause.

SPaG-subordinate clauses

Sometimes they even come in the **middle** of sentences:

My brother Richard, **who lives in Australia,**
is coming home for Christmas.
Commas break up the subordinate clause.
