## WHO IS HENRY MOORE? Meet Henry Moore and find out about his lumpy, bumpy, holey sculptures





Henry Moore is famous for his sculptures of people with bumpy forms and hollow spaces in their bodies. His sculptures also sometimes have holes right through them! As well as bumps and hollows he used flowing, abstract shapes in his sculptures. Look at this sculpture. It is of a figure lying down. Can you see its

Look at this sculpture. It is of a figure lying down. Can you see its head? What about its knees? Where's its stomach? There's a hole where its stomach should be!



Henry Moore's career spanned over fifty years that's a lot of sculptures! He died in 1986 and was buried only a few hundred yards from his home at St Thomas's Church in Perry Green.
